WHY SHOULD I REPORT A CRIME?

Half of all crime in the United States goes unreported. Why?

- Embarrassment
- Fear of repercussions/retaliation
- Feeling that reporting crime is futile

Law enforcement cannot solve crimes if they do not know about them. They cannot prevent crimes if they do not know there is a problem.

No matter how large the crime is report it to your local law enforcement agency. Your report, along with other similar reports, may help crime analysts recognize a trend or pattern in our area. This helps law enforcement to identify problems and address needs specific to vour area.

Reports can be filed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year in person, by phone, or online. If law enforcement agencies can predict crime, they have a better chance of reducing crime.

Report all suspicious people and suspicious vehicles. Remember. there are laws that protect victims and witnesses from retaliation or "tampering."

How to REPORT A CRIME

If you are a victim or a witness to a crime, the first rule is to get to safety! If you are the victim you might only be able to dial 9-1-1. Remember to leave the line open even if you cannot continue to talk. 9-1-1 is a recorded line and uses enhanced Caller ID to locate you. Even cell phone locations can be found with time. Deputies respond to every 9-1-1 call.

- Where is the crime happening? (Address, Mile Marker, Cross streets, etc.)
- What is happening? (Brief description)
- Who is involved? Be thorough and give detailed descriptions. Use the guide below.
- Vehicles? For any involved vehicles, be thorough. Tag numbers, color, damage, bumper stickers, etc. Use the guide on the back of this brochure.
- Provide a direction of travel.

IDENTIFYING SUSPECTS

Any information you can provide about a suspect will be helpful in investigating your report.
