POLICY

Criminal Intelligence. It is the policy of the Baltimore Police Department (BPD) to debrief arrestees, registered informants and sources of information to obtain criminal intelligence. Once gathered, the dissemination of this intelligence in a timely and accurate manner is vital to preventing and solving crime.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this Policy is to promote the use of Criminal/Informant Debriefing Form 223 when conducting a Criminal Debriefing or Custodial Interrogation to ensure certain specific questions are asked of the individual being debriefed/interrogated. All persons shall be advised of their constitutional rights prior to Custodial Interrogation (see Policy 1105, *Custodial Interrogations*).

DEFINITION

Criminal Debriefing — To question an individual (e.g., confidential source, cooperating witness, arrestee, etc.) for the purpose of obtaining intelligence for law enforcement purposes. This questioning is not likely to elicit an incriminating response.

Custodial Interrogation — When a suspect is under formal arrest or subject to a restraint on freedom of movement to the degree associated with a formal arrest. Interrogation includes any express questioning by a law enforcement officer or any words or actions on the part of the law enforcement officer that are reasonably likely to elicit an incriminating response.

REQUIRED ACTION

Member

- 1. A Criminal/Informant Debriefing Form 223 (see Appendix A) shall be completed, when practicable:
 - 1.1. When an individual is arrested and charged with an offense.
 - 1.2. Subsequent to all informant contacts, consistent with Policy 1001, *Confidential Informants*.

- 2. Using the form as a guide, the arresting/interviewing officer shall attempt to solicit information from an arrestee/informant on all listed topics.
- 3. The interviewing officer shall pursue an expanded line of questioning whenever an informative response to any question is obtained.
- 4. If the arrestee/informant refuses to answer any questions, the interviewing officer shall note the refusal in Section 2 and complete Section 3. Consistent with BPD policy and procedures, interviewing officers shall not coerce or intimidate an arrestee/informant into responding to any debriefing questions.
- 5. When the debriefing yields useful information, the interviewing officer shall notify the appropriate district, division, or unit in a timely fashion.
- **NOTE:** Immediate notification shall be made whenever information of a critical nature is obtained and any delay in communication could jeopardize the safety of others or result in a lost opportunity to solve or prevent a criminal act.
 - 5.1. Forward a copy of the Criminal/Informant Debriefing Form, and related reports, to the affected district, division or unit.
 - 5.2. Under such circumstances, consideration shall be given to enrolling the arrestee/informant as a confidential informant consistent with Policy 1001, *Confidential Informants.*
- 6. Submit the completed form and all attachments to your immediate supervisor prior to the end of the tour of duty.

Supervisor

- 1. Review all Criminal/Informant Debriefing Forms and ensure compliance with the requirements of this Policy.
- 2. Ensure that the interviewing officer has made all appropriate notifications.
