Law Enforcement Wellness in Retirement Seminar

1. TRAVEL REIMBURSEMENT PROCESS CHANGE

Finance Management will no longer enter travel reimbursement into the CHRIS system. To ensure the travel policies are correctly followed, Central Payroll will make the necessary direct entry into CHRIS.

Finance Management is to make sure the employee has provided all documentation according to the travel policy. The payroll processor will forward all required documentation by <u>Friday before the pay period processing week</u>. Central Payroll will audit the documentation and add the travel reimbursement to the employee's paycheck. If there are any missing documents, the reimbursement to the employee will be delayed.

2. CITY MANAGER ANNOUNCED THE LAUNCH OF "CINCYALERT"

Cincinnati City Manager Sheryl Long announced the launch of "CincyAlert" in a recent press conference. "CincyAlert", powered by Smart911, is now the official public alerting and emergency notification system used by the City of Cincinnati. The best way for the public to opt-in to these alerts is by creating a profile in the Smart911 app or online at http://www.cincyalert.org.

During and after a critical incident, coordinated and timely communication to the public is critical. Effective communication can save lives and property - and can promote credibility and public trust. The City will use this new tool to let people know what action they need to take to stay safe during a critical incident; whether that is to avoid the area of a dangerous situation, or stay where they are. Just as important, it will be used to let people know when a situation is no longer a danger. This expanded communication between the City's first responders and the people of Cincinnati will help keep everyone more informed and better prepared for emergencies.

As a component of "CincyAlert," the City has adopted an Emergency Incident Communications and Public Alerting Plan. The purpose of this plan is to establish a framework for how the City of Cincinnati will communicate information, internally and externally, during a critical incident. The Emergency Communications Center (ECC) is the agency designated to send internal and external (public) alerts based on the plan, or at the direction of City officials. Attached to these Staff Notes is an overview of the plan, provided by the ECC.

"CincyAlert" and implementation of the Public Alerting Plan will have minimal impact on CPD operations. CPD field supervisors should always consult with an ECC supervisor (by calling the ECC bridge by landline) to discuss the potential issuance of a public alert. In most circumstances, the alerts will be auto-generated and then managed by ECC personnel. In general, once a public alert has been initiated, the remaining hurdle will be to keep ECC updated on the incident circumstances and/or the need to put out an "all-clear" message to the public.

3. CITY OF CINCINNATI "311CINCY" CUSTOMER SERVICE UPDATE

<u>Attached</u> to these Staff Notes is the City of Cincinnati's *311Cincy* Customer Service Update. Department personnel should become familiar with the information contained in the City Manager's memo.

As a reminder:

- The City's former Customer Service phone number, 513-591-6000, was redirected into the 311 menu.
- Going forward, unless the City service is provided by GCWW, MSD, or Health Department (separate call centers), ECC is the answering call center.

Do <u>NOT</u> initiate a request to attend this training through the Records Management System (RMS). Police Training Section will complete all registrations, manage the entries into RMS, and notify personnel approved to attend.

Personnel may attend on duty with the approval of their supervisor. No overtime will be provided for personnel attending this training. Attendees shall wear conservative business attire or the operational uniform. 10. LAW ENFORCEMENT WELLNESS IN RETIREMENT SEMINAR

The CPD Wellness Program is co-sponsoring the seminar "Retirement: Being a Member of the Survivor's Club" with the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office on Tuesday, November 15, 2022, from 1830 – 2030 hours (see the event flyer attached to these Staff Notes). The course, presented by the Ohio Department of Public Safety Office of First Responder Wellness, will be held at the Hamilton County Education Services Center, 11083 Hamilton Avenue 45231. This seminar will help personnel who are ready to retire, or those who have recently retired, prepare for moving into the next chapter in a healthy and happy way physically, mentally, and socially.

Presenter Steve Click is the Director of First Responder Wellness for the Ohio Department of Public Safety. Steve served 36 years with the Ohio State Highway Patrol and oversaw their Member Assistance Team from 2002 to 2018. He has been active in peer support since 1993 and was deployed twice to New York City after the 9/11 attacks to work with the New York Police Department's peer support team. He also served as a liaison between the first responder community and the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services.

Emergency Incident Communications and Public Alerting Plan

Virtual Joint Information Center

During critical incidents, the City of Cincinnati will rapidly establish a Virtual Joint Information Center (JIC) via electronic messaging to link the following:

- City Manager and City PIO
- Police Chief and Police PIO
- Fire Chief and Fire PIO
- ECC Director and ECC PIO
- Other agency directors and PIOs as needed based on the situation

Alerts to Elected Officials

Based on Internal Emergency Alerts, Virtual JIC coordination, or other events, the City Manager may issue an Elected Official Emergency Alert (EOEA) to disseminate urgent information to the Mayor and City Council. The ECC Director, or designee, will send an EOEA at the direction of the City Manager.

Public Alert Message Types

Alerting for emergency incidents that trigger a public alert will include, at a minimum, an Initial Action Message, and an All-Clear Message.

- The purpose of the Initial Action Message is to inform the public of a potential or confirmed
 danger that could cause injury, death, or damage in a publicly accessible space. The message will
 include high-level information only, including the general location where an emergency has
 been reported, and the actions the public should take.
- The purpose of an All-Clear Message is to inform the public that the previously communicated emergency scene has been checked by responders and rendered safe, or the situation reported was confirmed as unfounded.

Initial Action Message Criteria

An Initial Action Message should be initiated by ECC automatically when there is an indication of the following situation:

- Report of an Active Assailant (e.g., Shooter)
- Report of a Bomb or Suspicious Device Found, in a public space, large building, or in close proximity to publicly accessible spaces.

An Initial Action Message may be requested by the Incident Commander or member of Public Safety Command Staff for any other incident, including:

- SWAT barricades in which there is a danger to those in proximity to the incident location.
- Explosions or building collapse, when there is (or could be) a continued danger to those in proximity to the incident location.
- Bomb threats to a public or occupied space, when the threat is considered credible, or the threatened location must be evacuated.

All-Clear Message Criteria

ECC will send the All-Clear Message at the direction of the Incident Commander.

Subject: 311Cincy Update



In an effort toward continuous improvement of service delivery, the City of Cincinnati has established the 311Cincy customer service environment. This includes a rebranded mobile app (311Cincy app), enhanced website (311ciny.com) and 24-hour call center. On Friday, March 11 (National 311 Day), the City of Cincinnati began the first phase of 311 call number deployment and online enhancements. 311 roll-out has occurred incrementally and, as of today, we enter the final implementation phase.

This afternoon the current customer service number for the Department of Public Services (591-6000) will be permanently diverted to the 311 call center now located within the Emergency Communication Center. Non-emergency Customer Service Representatives are available to answer constituent issues 24 hours a day, seven days a week. This is an unprecedented level of customer service we are proud to provide for our residents.

Customers of all major cell, VOIP, and landline carriers within the City of Cincinnati boundaries will only need to remember one number (311) for any non-emergency need 24/7.

- 311 callers will be redirected to the following call centers as necessary: CHD, MSD, and GCWW. If a constituent is using a 10-digit number to reach a City call center, they will still be able to utilize that 10-digit number.
- o 311Cincy will handle all other non-emergency customer service calls.
- o The new 10-digit customer service number is 513-765-1212, for people used to calling 513-591-6000, those calls will automatically be redirected to 311 indefinitely.

Future enhancements to the 311Cincy infrastructure include text message confirmations, virtual assistant for the website, enhanced customer satisfaction monitoring, and user testing of the systems. 311Cincy is committed to continually improving to meet the needs of both the public and City departments to deliver efficient and effective services.
