Certification Scheme – Advanced Emergency Medical Technician

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Intent

This policy specifies the certification scheme for the Nationally Registered Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (NRAEMT) certification, including scope of certification, job and task description, required competence, required abilities, prerequisites, and applicable code of conduct.

Scope

This certification scheme applies to Nationally Registered Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (NRAEMT) candidates and certificants.

Definitions

AEMT – Advanced Emergency Medical Technician

Certification – National Registry verification that an individual possesses the knowledge, skills, and abilities (competencies) to do a job as defined by the requirements of the certification scheme.

Recertification - The renewal or maintenance of certification in which stated requirements are met.

Policy

Scope of Certification

This certification is aligned with the AEMT role as defined by the current National EMS Scope of Practice Model (NHTSA, 2021) which states:

The AEMT is a health professional whose primary focus is to respond to, assess and triage non-urgent, urgent, and emergent requests for medical care, apply basic and focused advanced knowledge and skills necessary to provide patient care and/or medical transportation, and facilitate access to a higher level of care when the needs of the patient exceed the capability level of the AEMT. The additional preparation beyond EMT prepares an AEMT to improve patient care in common emergency conditions for which reasonably safe, targeted, and evidence-based interventions exist. Interventions within the AEMT scope of practice may carry more risk if not performed properly than interventions authorized for the EMR/EMT levels. With proper supervision, AEMTs may serve as a patient care team member in a hospital or healthcare setting to the full extent of their education, certification, licensure, and credentialing. In a community setting an AEMT might visit patients at home and make observations that are reported to a higher-level authority to help manage a patient's care (p. 20).

Job and Task Description

This certification is aligned with the AEMT role as defined by the current National EMS Scope of Practice Model (NHTSA, 2021). This document describes the AEMT role as

- "Function as part of a comprehensive EMS response, community, health, or public safety system with medical oversight.
- Perform interventions with the basic and advanced equipment typically found on an ambulance.
- Perform focused advanced skills and pharmacological interventions that are engineered to mitigate specific life-threatening conditions, medical, and psychological conditions with a targeted set of skills beyond the level of an EMT.
- Function as an important link from the scene into the health care system." (p. 21).

The National Registry conducts a Practice Analysis between 4 and 6 years in accordance with the *National Registry Practice Analysis Policy*. The latest National Registry Practice Analysis identifies the necessary knowledge, skills, and abilities for the profession.

Required Competence

The NRAEMT certification is designed to verify entry level competency for AEMTs.

Required Abilities

The National Registry requires the validation of abilities as a prerequisite to national NRAEMT certification by a state-approved EMS Program and attestation of completion of the AEMT level Student Minimum Competencies. Psychomotor skills must be demonstrated according to criteria set by the State EMS Office for the Advanced Emergency Medical Technician level in the form of Student Minimum Competencies or the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs (CAAHEP) Voluntary Accreditation Student Minimum Competency requirements.

Code of Conduct

The National Registry Code of Conduct applies to all National Registry candidates and certificants.

<u>Prerequisites to Certification:</u>

EMS Program Course Completion within 2 years:

- 1. Current National Registry certification (NREMT) or state license at the EMT level or higher.
- Successful completion of a state-approved Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (AEMT) course, or completion of a higher-level state-approved EMS course that meets or exceeds the National Emergency Medical Services Education Standards for the Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (NHTSA, 2021).
- All AEMT candidates who started their AEMT education program on or after July 1, 2024, are required to meet the state-approved Student Minimum Competencies (SMC) or CoAEMSP Recommended Student Minimum Competency Matrix.

- 4. Submission of a completed application with verification from a state-approved AEMT course completion by the EMS Program Director including applicable payment.
- 5. Successful completion of the National Registry AEMT certification examination.
 - a. Results are valid 24 months.

Current State-Licensed AEMT Candidates:

- All AEMT candidates who started their state-approved AEMT education program on or after July 1, 2024, are required to meet the state-approved Student Minimum Competencies (SMC) or CoAEMSP Recommended Student Minimum Competency Matrix.
- 2. Submission of a current, active AEMT state license, equivalent state-recognized EMS level, or higher-level state EMS license.
- 3. Submission of the required number of continuing education credits aligned with the current model of the National Component of the National Continued Competency Program (NCCP).
 - a. The National Component for AEMT is 25 continuing education credits. See NCCP model for specific criteria on content domain requirements.
 - i. All education must have been completed within the last 2 years. Two-year course eligibility is based on the date of the last documented course.
 - b. Continuing education credits must adhere to the National Registry Accepted Education and Documentation Policy, Standardized Course Credits Policy, and Academic Credit Policy which includes education that is CAPCE-accredited or accepted by a State EMS Office, or, if a college or U.S. university course, it must be from an accredited institution and related to EMS patient care.
- 4. Submission of a completed application with applicable payment.
- 5. Successful completion of the National Registry AEMT certification examination.
 - a. Results are valid 24 months.

Re-entry (lapsed National Registry and/or state EMS license):

- All AEMT candidates who started their state-approved AEMT education program on or after July 1, 2024, are required to meet the state-approved Student Minimum Competencies (SMC) or CoAEMSP Recommended Student Minimum Competency Matrix.
- 2. Submission of a lapsed state AEMT license/certification if never nationally certified as an AEMT.
- 3. Submission of the required number of continuing education credits aligned with the current model of the NCCP consisting of National, Local, and Individual Components.
 - a. The NCCP Model for AEMT is 50 continuing education credits. See NCCP model for specific criteria on content domain requirements.
 - i. All education must have been completed within the last 2 years. Two-year course eligibility is based on the date of the last documented course.
- 4. Continuing education credits must adhere to the National Registry Accepted Education and Documentation Policy, Standardized Course Credits Policy, and Academic Credit Policy which includes education that is CAPCE-accredited or accepted by a State EMS Office, or, if a college or U.S. university course, it must be from an accredited institution and related to EMS patient care.
- 5. Submission of a completed application including applicable payment.
- 6. Successful completion of the National Registry AEMT certification examination.

- a. Results are valid 24 months.
- 7. Verification of skills competency prior to the first expiration date.
 - a. Skills verification must be completed by one of the following mechanisms between the date of issuance of national EMS certification and the first expiration date.
 - b. If the candidate does not successfully demonstrate skills verification within the allocated timeframe, the candidate will not be allowed to recertify, and the certification will lapse.
 - c. Approved skills competency verification must be completed by one of the following methods:
 - i. If the candidate affiliates with a National Registry Agency and has their skills competency verified (third-party) by their Agency's medical director or training officer, this satisfies the requirement for re-entry.
 - ii. A State EMS Office or State-Approved or CAAHEP Accredited Education Program.
 - iii. Provide verification of their current, full, and unrestricted state license.
 - With a current, full, and unrestricted state license to provide care, the candidate demonstrates minimum skills competency, as required by a state licensing body.

Criteria for Issuance of Initial Certification

- 1. Documented completion of all prerequisites including certification examination.
- 2. Met the eligibility requirements of the *Terms of Certification*.

Certification Period

- 1. The time period of certification for the NRAEMT certification is two years.
- 2. Initial expiration dates are determined by the date the candidate successfully completes the entire national certification process. AEMT candidates completing the national certification process between January 1 and June 30 will receive an expiration date of March 31 two years in the future. Individuals successfully completing the national certification process between July 1 and December 31 will receive an expiration date of March 31 three years in the future.
- 3. Recertification expiration dates are two years from the expiration date of the prior period.

Criteria for Recertification

- 1. Met the eligibility requirements of the *Terms of Certification*.
- 2. Recertification can be accomplished by either continuing education or examination.
 - a. Recertification by Continuing Education Credits: Complete 50 credits of approved continuing education after the initial certification date and before the expiration date of the certification. Continuing education credits must be accepted by the State EMS Office or accredited by CAPCE.
 - The objectives of the current National Component of the NCCP must be met, consisting of at least 25 credits of approved continuing education. Ten percent of the content must be pediatric focused.
 - ii. At least 12.5 credits of state accepted or CAPCE accredited continuing education for the Local Component of the NCCP, meeting any State or Local requirements.

- iii. At least 12.5 credits of state accepted or CAPCE accredited continuing education for the Individual Component of the NCCP.
- b. Recertification by Examination: Successful completion of the National Registry AEMT certification examination not more than one year before the current certification expiration date. Only one attempt at the examination is allowed. If a passing score is not achieved, continuing education can be used if completed within the certification period.
- 3. Completion of the recertification application and paid appropriate fees.
- 4. Verification of continued competency for skills and abilities by the local Medical Director and verification of education by the Training Officer is required for active status certification.
 - a. If verification cannot be provided, recertification is allowed as inactive. Verification of continued competency for skills and abilities by a local medical director is required to convert inactive status to active status.

<u>Criteria for Suspending and Withdrawing Certification</u>

The criteria for withdrawing and suspending certification are specified by the *Terms of Certification* and *Disciplinary Action* policies.

Criteria for Changing the Scope of Level of Certification

In the event of a significant change in the scope of the certification, the National Registry releases a *Transition Policy* to implement the change in scope, including the required assessments.

Certificants may request to drop to a lower-level certification. If they wish to regain the certification level, they will need to follow the appropriate prerequisites for certification (*See reference Request a Lower Certification Level policy*).

Rationale

The certification scheme is developed with an objective of providing assurance that a person who seeks or maintains national EMS certification meets specific requirements and demonstrated competency. Recognition of competence through the achievement of national certification leads to increased public confidence and protection of the public.

The certification practices of the National Registry are consistent with the ISO 17024:2012 standards and current National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA) standards. The assessment and examination practices of the National Registry are consistent with the Standards for Educational and Psychological Testing (AERA, APA, & NCME, 2014) and National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA) standards.
