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What is the Crisis Intervention Team?

Police Departments across the country are frequently called to crisis incidents involving persons with a mental illness. Sometimes these situations are high risk and can lead to tragedy.

Realizing the need for a specialized law enforcement team that could effectively, compassionately and safely deal with persons involved in a mental health crisis, a crisis intervention team was developed by the St. Louis County Police Department. With cooperation from mental health organizations such as the National Alliance for the Mentally III (NAMI), Missouri Department of Mental Health, Behavioral Health Response (BHR), BJC Behavioral Health and the St. Louis County Counselor's Office, a coordinating council was formed, and a program was developed for the first Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) in the St. Louis area.

The St. Louis County Police Department's CIT is made up of officers and sergeants who are selected to participate in a 40-hour training program at the St. Louis County and Municipal Police Academy. This is an intensive specialized course which provides officers with the skills, methods and tactics to safely de-escalate incidents involving persons involved in a mental health crisis. Upon receiving this specialized training, officers return to serve in a patrol capacity, but are available to respond to and handle mental health crisis situations.

What Are the Benefits of the Crisis Intervention Team

- Greater efficiency in obtaining care for persons involved in a mental health crisis.
- Significant decrease in injuries, death and community dissent.
- Reduction of recidivism and arrests by diverting individuals with a mental illness to the St. Louis County Mental Health Docket or the St. Louis County Jail Diversion Project.
- Enhances officer skills and on-scene expertise in responding safely to mental health crisis situations and increases citizen confidence in reporting incidents.
- Increased cooperation between criminal justice and mental health systems.
- CIT saves the public money by utilizing inpatient facilities rather than jail.
- Improved satisfaction from the mentally ill person and their family.
- Increased officer safety.

St. Louis County Mental Health Docket

The Mental Health Docket of the St. Louis County Municipal Court System is a specialized docket for certain St. Louis County ordinance violations. If the County Counselor receives information indicating a defendant is possibly laboring under the effects of some mental illness, with or without co-occurring addictions/disorders, his or her charges may be placed on the Mental Health Docket. This specialty docket provides intensive court supervision and mental health resource assistance to such defendants.

St. Louis County Jail Diversion Project

The St. Louis County Jail Diversion Project is available to certain individuals who will go through the intake process of the St. Louis County Jail for certain St. Louis County ordinance violations. Once the jail intake staff becomes aware that a prisoner has some possible mental illness, with or without possible co-occurring addictions/ disorders, the prisoner may be placed in the Jail Diversion Project. The Jail Diversion Project will provide the individual with intensive mental health resource assistance with goals of reduced recidivism, decreased jail time and less punitive dispositions.
