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What is Law Enforcement Exploring

The St. Louis County Police Department's Explorer program is designed to allow young men and women, ages 14 to 21, to explore a career in law enforcement. The program allows young people to serve their community and decide if a career in law enforcement is in their future. The program builds leadership, character, confidence, discipline and a sense of community in young people.

An Explorer Is:

- An important part of the St. Louis County Police Department.
- A valuable resource for the community.
- A young adult having fun while learning new skills.

An Explorer Is Not:

- A police officer or police informant.
- Expected to make arrests.
- Exposed to danger.

What Skills Will I Learn?

Each new Explorer is encouraged to attend the Bi-Annual St. Louis Area Law Enforcement Explorer Academy. Explorers may also attend the National Law Enforcement Exploring Conference which is held at a major university across the country every other year :

- Radio Procedure
- Police Procedures and Organization
- Crime Scene Investigation
- Neighborhood Policing Philosophies
- Firearms Safety
- Opportunities for Employment
- Physical Fitness
- Criminal Law
- Patrol Techniques
- Crime Detection
- Ride-On-Patrol with Officers
- Other Assigned Duties

How Do I Qualify?

- Be between the ages of 14 and 21 at the time of application to the post.
- Have no serious criminal record.
- Be of good moral character and possess the ability to work well with others, learn new skills and accept direction and responsibilities.
- Have a recommendation from your school principal.
- Obtain your parent's written approval if under the age of 17.
- Have at least a "C" grade average on the last school report card.

What Would I Do?

Explorers with the St. Louis County Police Department can ride on patrol with officers to gain firsthand experience in law enforcement.

Explorers also assist the Department with special events such as DARE, child safety presentations, fingerprinting children, directing traffic and various administrative duties.

Additional duties include:

• Providing additional resources for the St. Louis County Police Department in times of major incidents or natural disasters.

Explorers may also be eligible to receive community service credits from their high school.

Can I Bring a Friend?

Absolutely! Many of our new Explorers bring along a best friend, classmate, brother or sister. Explorer activities include many fun events, social outings and fundraisers throughout the year.
