1.6 Agency Jurisdiction and Mutual Aid

1.6.1 Geographical Boundaries (Revised: 3/24/26)

- A. The UCSF Police Department has primary law enforcement jurisdiction for all properties owned, controlled or leased by UCSF, located within the State of California. The Department's primary patrol jurisdiction encompasses a combination of real properties under the control of UCSF in San Francisco, Alameda and San Mateo Counties, including facilities in San Francisco, Oakland, Daly City and South San Francisco. The Department's primary investigative responsibility for crimes at all other UCSF sites in California shall be as authorized by the Chief of Police or his/her designee. Specific UCSF facility site locations are maintained in the ECC.
- B. The UCSF Police Department shall adhere to the jurisdictional authority outlined in General Order 1.1.4, "Legally Mandated Authority," PC § 830.2 (b) and Education Code § 92600.
- C. Officers shall keep in mind that their primary responsibility is to provide police services to the UC community and facilities owned, occupied and/or controlled by the UC, including any contracted policing properties or locations. The intent of this policy is to provide guidance to UCSF Police Department personnel to stay focused on providing quality service and protection to the UCSF property and community.
- D. The ECC maintains a large map of the City and County of San Francisco and a list of UCSF facilities to identify the Police Department's jurisdictional boundaries and responsibilities. These will be updated as needed or at least annually by the FSD. Each officer shall be familiar with the geographical boundaries, accompanying satellite UCSF facilities and all contracted policing areas.
 - 1. When there is a question concerning jurisdiction, the Watch Commander shall be consulted to make a determination.
- E. The primary patrol jurisdiction (i.e., patrol zone) for campus properties includes Parnassus Heights, Mission Bay, Mt. Zion, Hyde Hospital, Stanyan Hospital, Benioff Children's Hospital Oakland, all UCSF-owned, -leased or -controlled properties within campus boundaries and all public property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks and parking facilities, within campus boundaries or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus. The UCSF Police Department Security Services Division patrols the UCSF Fresno campus, covering only UCSF-controlled property. The campus patrol jurisdiction is consistent with UCSF's Clery geography, maintained by the Clery Coordinator/Crime Analyst. (Note that the "campus" properties identified above may not meet the definition of "on-campus" property under the Clery Act.)
- F. The primary patrol jurisdiction (i.e., patrol zone) for non-campus properties (i.e., satellite UCSF facilities) is limited to the facilities themselves and does not have a public property

component. A non-campus property, for patrol jurisdiction purposes, is defined as any building or property owned, leased or controlled by UCSF that is not within the reasonably contiguous geographic area of a UCSF campus, as defined in section E of this General Order. These non-campus properties include, but are not limited to: Mission Center Building, 2 North Point, 1930 Market Street, 1263 Mission Street, Buchanan Dental Clinic, China Basin, Lakeshore Plaza, Oyster Point, Hunter's Point Facility and Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital. Non-campus property also includes non-UCSF-controlled properties at which the Department is contractually obligated to provide police and/or security services, including UC Law San Francisco and UC Office of the President. (Note that the "non-campus" properties described above may not meet the definition of "non-campus" property under the Clery Act.)

- G. The Department and its officers retain the right to patrol areas outside of the primary patrol jurisdictions described above on a limited or on-going basis, as necessary to ensure the safety of UCSF affiliates and property.
