#### **PURPOSE:**

This policy provides guidelines for the pursuit of motor vehicles.

#### **POLICY:**

A motor vehicle pursuit is justified when the necessity of the apprehension of a suspect outweighs the risk created by the pursuit. Officers shall continually evaluate all circumstances surrounding a pursuit. If the degree of danger to the public, the pursuing officer(s), and/or the suspect(s) is greater than the necessity for immediate apprehension, a pursuit should not be initiated, or if in progress, it should be terminated.

Pursuit driving is not justified and is prohibited unless the occupants of the vehicle are known to be wanted for the commission or the attempted commission of a violent felony or the vehicle is being operated in an erratic or dangerous manner which poses a threat of harm to the public if it is not stopped.

The pursuit of a motor vehicle, for the commission of a minor motor vehicle violation and /or operating a stolen motor vehicle, is therefore prohibited unless operated in an erratic <u>and</u> dangerous manner.

### LOCALITY:

The City of Worcester is a highly congested urban area which generally precludes pursuit driving in a safe manner. Therefore, every effort shall be made to prevent a suspect vehicle from escalating a situation into one which requires a pursuit. Pursuit driving is only permitted in situations—that represent a threat of harm to the public or the officers, if the suspect vehicle and/or occupants are not apprehended. The Department recognizes that it is better to allow a suspect to escape than to engage in a pursuit under conditions that unnecessarily jeopardize the safety of any person.

Pursuit Driving Tactics	Barricading Roadways	Barricading a roadway is justified only in those situations where the suspect has committed a violent or life-threatening felony and where all other methods of apprehension have failed or would be ineffective. Only a Shift Commander or Command Staff Member may authorize that a roadway be barricaded for the purpose of apprehending the occupant(s) of a suspect vehicle. Whenever a barricade is utilized department vehicles shall utilize full emergency lights and no one shall remain in or directly behind the barricade or vehicle(s). The barricade shall never be around a 'blind corner', shall be plainly visible from a sufficient distance, and should be implemented in such a way as to have the suspect voluntarily stop fleeing.
	Caravanning	Only two (2) Worcester Police vehicles may engage in an active pursuit. An Operations Division Supervisor may permit additional officers to assist in a pursuit if circumstances warrant it.
	Deliberate Contact	Deliberate contact is prohibited unless specifically authorized and ordered by the Operations Division Supervisor, Patrol Shift Commander, or Command Staff Member and where the suspect poses an imminent threat of death or serious bodily harm to the public or officers.
	Firearms Discharges	Firearms shall not be discharged at or from a moving vehicle unless the officer is being threatened with deadly force by an occupant of the target vehicle. This prohibition exists for two reasons:  1. The probability that bullets might ricochet and cause injury to innocent persons; and/or  2. The probability of the suspect vehicle crashing and causing injury to innocent persons if the bullets do not ricochet, but disable the operator.
	Motorcycle Units	If a pursuit is initiated by a motorcycle unit, the motorcycle unit shall discontinue the pursuit as soon as a marked Department vehicle engages in the pursuit. Department members may always discontinue a pursuit when conditions make it unreasonable to continue.
	Passing	Attempts to pass another police vehicle are prohibited, unless the police vehicle is disabled, a marked vehicle takes the lead from an unmarked vehicle or motorcycle, or ordered by the Operations Division Supervisor.
Pursuit Driving Tactics (continued)	Reckless/ Hazardous Driving	Officers shall not duplicate the reckless operation displayed by fleeing suspects. Officers are strictly prohibited from wrong way operation on a controlled access or divided highway.
	Spacing	All units in pursuit shall space themselves at a safe distance to ensure proper braking and reaction time. As speed increases, the distance between vehicles should increase to allow for a greater need of reaction time.
	Tire Deflation	Should be considered as an effective option for bringing a pursuit
