Middle School Program teaches students how to live drug-free lives confidently, drawing on the strengths of the students, their families, and communities.</li> <li>Like the elementary school curriculum, the acronym "REAL" is the central message of the curriculum and teaches students four ways to refuse drug offers — Refuse, Explain, Avoid, and Leave. These strategies help students stay away from drugs by preparing them to act decisively and responsibly in difficult situations.</li> <li>The 10-lesson middle-school curriculum is highly interactive, involves multiple media materials that students find engaging, and, like the elementary school curriculum, is based on Social Emotional Learning Theory (SEL) principles that fit well with current research and practice in teaching middle school students.</li> </ul>
